CHESTER C. FARRELL, D. D. S.**An Appreciation**

Chester C. Farrell was the son of Mr. and Mrs. John Farrell of Callaway, Nebraska, and born at Plainview, Minnesota, March 1, 1873. He was married June 1, 1899, to Tilda Quist of Gothenburg, Nebraska, who with two daughters, Hazel and Frances, survive him. After practicing at Cozad for a number of years, he came to Gothenburg in 1913, where he continued to practice up until the time of his death.

Chester Farrell was a member of the Northwestern District Dental Society, and had served it as an officer in all chairs including that of president; was a member of the Nebraska State Dental Society, in which he had held many offices, including that of its president; member of the National Dental Association; he was at the time of his death, president of the Farrel Study Club of Denver, Colorado, which was named in his honor; and a member of the Delta Sigma Delta fraternity.

Chester Farrell possessed in a high degree the essential qualifications for the practice of dentistry and to this there was added a personality which made him an agreeable and efficient teacher both among college students and members of the dental profession. He has always taken an active interest in dental society affairs and enjoyed the reputation throughout the middle west as an able clinician.

For many years he paid close attention to the preparation of cavities and the manipulation of gold foil and served on the faculty of the Colorado Dental College as instructor of these subjects.

The dental profession has lost one of its keenest students and many dentists who enjoyed the relationship of comrade will miss him.

Funeral services were held at the Gothenburg home and Drs. H. C. Brock, O. H. Cressler of North Platte; . A. Meservey of Kearney; V. K. Lowe of Omaha; S. A. Allen, Loup City, and F. H. Welden of Gothenburg were pallbearers. Interment was made in Cozad.

This solution under many trade names sold to dentists for the purpose of removing collections of tartar and stains from teeth, will do about all that the labels on the bottles claim, and this much more: It will dissolve lime accumulations on drinking cups and cuspidors; dental cements; synthetic fillings; tooth structure, both enamel and dentine.

If, as I pointed out some time ago and which I still believe, a substance will destroy tooth structure as rapidly as this material, it is reasonable to conclude that it will aid in the advancement of conditions toward a beginning for caries, especially in liable areas of teeth in persons susceptible to tooth decay.

NOTICE TO DENTAL RESERVE MEN

A member of the Journal staff is in receipt of a letter from the Surgeon General's Office, signed by Lt. Col. W. H. G. Logan, D. D. S., M. D., to the effect that a general order prohibits, for the present, the assignment of additional dental officers until the strength of the army is increased; that upon the increase of the army, the first to be assigned must be those dentists now acting as privates in the various camps, holding commissions in the Dental Reserve Corps. The department also explains that it will be several months before all such available officers will be placed on duty under their commissions, and that the present schools of instruction in Plastic and Oral Surgery maintained by the government are to be discontinued with the present course of instruction.
